THE VALUE OF COLLABORATING WITH AUDIOLOGISTS AND SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGISTS

WHAT WE DO

Audiologists provide patient-centered care in the prevention, identification, diagnosis, and evidence-based treatment of hearing, balance, and other auditory disorders for people of all ages.

Speech-language pathologists (SLPs) provide services to individuals with a variety of speech, language, cognitive, and swallowing differences and disorders. Types of services include prevention, assessment, treatment, and consultation.



HOW WE ADD VALUE

The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) represents 198,000 members and affiliates who are audiologists; speech-language pathologists; speech, language, and hearing scientists; audiology and speech-language pathology support personnel; and students.

Audiologists and SLPs use their expertise on teams in healthcare and education settings to address the impact of conditions like fetal alcohol syndrome, depression, and diabetes on hearing and communication.

Audiologists and SLPs also play a critical role in addressing other conditions/syndromes across the life span as well as contributing expertise to procedures/processes. Examples include:
